3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

The college renders various community services through its different departments and clubs.

The NSS is one such agency that is committed to community service with its motto declaring Not Me But Thou. The thrust area of activities for the year 2013-14 was Organic Farming & Health. The seven day camp included krishi survey of six houses of ward 9 of Kaduthuruthy Panchayath to identify the modes of farming and issues confronted by the farmers. The volunteers assisted the construction of kitchen gardens for six families based on the principles of organic farming.

To involve students in anti- addiction activities, the NSS units constituted an Anti-Addiction Cell on 26<sup>th</sup> Feb. 2014 with the Circle Inspector of Excise Department and members from the Health department as executive members. The cell is committed to advise the students and render a helping hand to enable them to thwart any attempts of use of drugs.

An anti drug awareness programme was also organized in collaboration with the Kerala State Youth Welfare Board, Kottayam. Five students were part of the troupe which performed at various places like public spots, schools and colleges in Ernakulam and Kottayam districts.

NSS volunteers painted the bed coats of female wards and cleaned the premises at Government Primary Health Centre, Thalayolaparambu during a minicamp.

NSS activities are concentrated on environment protection and on World Environment Day 100 saplings were planted in the college campus.

Awareness on AIDS was created among the NSS students and the public by conducting a rally on World Aids Day.

NSS also typed the blood group of 220 students during a blood camp.

In collaboration with Vaikom Taluk the NSS initiated the process of registering 164 students for voter's id card on 30<sup>th</sup> sept 13.

The NCC activities began on June 5<sup>th</sup> observing environmental day, by cleaning the campus and planting trees.

Planting of 100 trees in and around the college locality was undertaken as part of observing the year for protecting environment by the NCC.

To tackle the rising road accidents and neglect of road safety rules, NCC implemented a lecture on Road Safety Rules and the importance of observing them by the State Transport Commissioner ADGP Sri. Rishiraj Singh IPS under the auspices of NCC.

In order to inculcate the indigenous mathematical practice of Indian method of Mathematics to school students the department of Mathematics organized a programme on Vedic mathematics.

The department of Physics conducted a class on astronomy and astrophysics in collaboration with the Consortium for Astronomy Education and Public Outreach in Kerala.

An elaborate street play was enacted by the members of the film club and NSS in the college, with the support of KSCSTE, Trivandrum and sponsored by DST, New Delhi. The play was played around in various venues including colleges and schools.

The department of Chemistry assisted the Kerala Police Department in analyzing the chemical components of a suspected 'explosive'. The police department sought the help of the staff to identify the powder found in the box. On analysis the powder was found to be a false scare.

The department of Chemistry also assisted an entrepreneur of a small scale industrial unit to adopt more economical ways for fine finishing of steel products in Thalayolaparmbu by conducting a chemical analysis of his industrial products. Analyses were carried out in the chemistry laboratory and results were handed over to the industrialist.

The department of Botany organized a talk on agri-based enterprises for the benefit of the community so that people may take the initiative of setting up industries.

As an initiative of the extension activity, Scholar in the Campus, the department invited Prof.K. Pappooty former Director, Kerala State Institute of Encyclopediac Publications to talk on "Eyes on ISON-comet I and the solar system".

The library conducted an exhibition of books in association with the DC books for the public readers

The debate club conducted 4 debates on current issues like moral policing, gender equality etc, relevant to the public.

The bio-diversity club of the college established 'shanti sthal' with financial assistance from Kerala State Bio-diversity Board. The plants, a total of 52 plants of 39 species are preserved for the benefit of the those interested in valuable plants.

The career and guidance club conducted bank and PSC and other competitive exams coaching class two months.

The womens' forum held classes for adolescent girls.

The Nature Club conducted intercollegiate painting competition on Last Drop of Water and distributed prizes to winners.

The quiz club also conducted interschool quiz for the public.
